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Our numbers are a **growing** in the Bay



Well as many of you remember back in May in Queenstown Sounds of Hawkes Bay Chorus gained 3rd placing overall and our best score to date.

This result was so exhilarating for us all; we all came back to the Bay with stars in our eyes. We felt we had something to celebrate and approached the newspapers both in Hastings and Napier to do an article on us.

Then the music team wanted to bring our planned membership drive forward from July to June. The date was 3 weeks away so emergency meetings were held at the weekends and a very enthusiastic and passionate group on the Management Team had it all under control. We were getting exposure in all directions in the papers thanks to Jan Toynbee's constant phone calls and emails. We are very lucky to have a member whose parents own a printing business and our Crystal has wonderful skills at design and ideas. We used photos of us in our very vibrant green costumes to style very colourful full gloss posters. We all worked on the appropriate wording and message that we thought would to draw attention to our Chorus. Here in Hawkes Bay we have to compete with up to 30 other singing or dramatic groups for women.

Every member had to put 6-10 posters somewhere most were A4 but we printed a dozen A3 that went into Mitre 10's and the big supermarkets. We printed 300 smaller flyers that

were put under wipers in car parks. We targeted cafés, libraries, schools, kindys, shops, doctors' rooms, hospitals, hairdressers and any other place an A4 poster could fit.

We focused on the 4 free vocal lessons and that we were an active fun loving group of ladies who enjoy singing a cappella. We showcased our 3rd placing. We all knew we only got this placing because the three 600 plus choruses were not competing this year but hey! the general public here in the Bay were not aware of this. To them we were really successful and yes we were in our own hearts. A medal is a medal. We worked very hard for it.

Our membership team organised goody bags and the music team had a very slick evening organised.

I am always the contact number on our posters as I work from home and I knew there was quite a bit of interest before the open night arrived. Then on Monday the 17th June the ladies started to arrive and just kept coming on through our door - we had to put out more chairs, they were given their goody bags and a past PitchPipe magazine to look at while waiting.

The chorus was warming up in another room. So an elite small group of us meet, greeted, talked and smiled to this excited group of ladies. In total 26 came through the door (well 25 plus a husband). The evening started with our beautiful Makere taking physicals and doing the most amazing Zumba to loud pumping music. The smiles on their faces said it all "oh my gosh this is fun....!"

The evening went off without a hitch, we wowed them from the risers a

few tears were wiped as we sung our ballad, we involved them in simple songs and tags and specially chosen members talked to them about different experiences in the world of being a Sweet Adeline. The evening finished with a superb super.

The following Monday came and a few were missing but a few new ones arrived with friends and our 4 weeks of lessons and info started. They were all voice tested by Lana and we had some of every part.

An integral part of our singers wanted program was the very important 'buddy System'. We always do this and everyone was given a 'friend' to guide them through the next few weeks.

A job description was put in our weekly newsletter and from what feedback we've had this worked so well for many new members. They were all made to feel they were important. Which of course they are.

They had 40 minutes on their own after physical and vocals then came and joined us on the risers learning some new songs with us. After 4 weeks they were given achievement certificates and bookmarks with a montage of our chorus over the years. Our audition song is the Irish Blessing, so after 2 weeks the auditions started. Well they just kept coming each week and more auditioned and to date we have 16 yes 16 new enthusiastic

happy members. We have sent off the first group of registrations to America.

As a chorus we are just buzzing like we were in Queenstown.

Yes you get lots through the doors on open nights but they usually drop off bit by bit and we are happy with 4-5 new members, but 16.

We have a weekend workshop in August with Heather Jonson from Christchurch City chorus and this just gave another perspective on our art form with lots of new and exciting strategies. She gave us all so much to work on and at the end of the weekend we had new members forming quartets. We now have five members under 30, three of these under 25. Some of this is due to the Young Women in Harmony programmes we have been running in our schools for the last 13 years .We are beginning to reap the rewards. YOUNG MEMBERS!!

I realise the dynamics in our chorus is going to be different. Choruses are always evolving this is what keeps our art form moving forward. We have some awesome new ladies who I'm sure are only just realising that their lives will never be the same. Members join us for all different reasons but the one thing apart from enjoying singing is the team effort it takes to make it all work. Without our passionate teams we would not have achieved this result and without this result we wouldn't be a 45 member chorus.

SOUNDS OF HAWKES BAY CHORUS

Joyfully **Unmunted'**

Christchurch Cardboard Cathedral opening

What an honour it was for the Christchurch City Chorus to be invited to sing in the city's new transitional cathedral on August 7th.

The chorus performed an hour long concert as part of the Joyfully Un-Munted Festival. This ten-concert series celebrated the opening of this cathedral which replaces the Christchurch Cathedral destroyed in the earthquakes of 2011.


Known locally as the cardboard cathedral, this unique and exciting building was designed by Japanese architect Shigeru Ban and built by local firm Warren and Mahoney. It can accommodate up to 700 people and has an expected lifespan of 50 years.

The building is shaped like an oldfashioned ridge tent and incorporates 98 beams encased in cardboard tubes. A large trinity window above the entrance has brightly coloured

triangular panels featuring images from the original Christchurch Cathedral's rose window. Inside, the design is minimalist with white walls and light pours between the soaring cardboard tubes.

From the stage, beneath a cardboard crucifix, the chorus had a wonderful view of the beautiful trinity window and when the foyer doors opened, we could see across to Latimer Square a lovely green space surrounded by trees. The excitement was palpable as the audience filled the seats, gazing in admiration at these new surroundings.

Any doubts about the acoustics were cast aside as we performed to a full house. Standing close together on risers belonging to a local college with three rows of singers on the floor and little room to move, we couldn't have performed with more joy. There was a real intimacy between the chorus and audience.



We performed a selection of our repertoire including our competition songs for Hawaii and a New Zealand bracket. Two quartets and a group from within the chorus also sang. A highlight was to sing When I Lift up My Head gifted to the chorus by Lea Beverley in 2011 following the city's devastating earthquakes.

We indeed felt 'lifted up' by the occasion. The audience left smiling and complimentary.

This was a Sweet Adaline evening to treasure.

Taranaki Harmony Chorus: Making Changes and

Moving Forward

Taranaki Harmony Chorus (THC) has been busy working on their image and wanted to share their progress with their Sweet Adeline sisters.

Rechartering issues in 2011 drove THC to undertake a detailed review. After much discussion and soul searching, three priorities were determined; marketing, recruitment and retention. This structured review mirrored that detailed by Kathy Carmody at the 'Doing it with Passion weekend' in Wellington (Dec 2012); hearing this confirmed that they were on the right track. They then committed themselves to a process which, although still ongoing, has borne fruit.

The enclosed poster highlights several of the recent changes that they have made in order to address their priority needs as a chorus.

A full-size banner and business card were produced and colour matched to performance photo costumes. Although much of the preliminary work was completed from within chorus members, THC recognised where their skill set fell short



and a graphic designer was engaged to modernise the chorus logo which features now in all products. The business card contact line was left clear to ensure individual members could write their details on. This was an important point for such a geographically spread chorus where local number contact tended to work better when recruiting, thus empowering each member of chorus to play a big part toward PR and advertising.

Determining a need for a less formal (and cooler) outfit for activities such as cake stall running which would bond the team, THC tried several options of shirt which could 'match' with existing costumes. With a new logo hot off the press they worked to find the best platform for its display whilst keeping within a budget. The less formal gear chosen offers a modern, striking identity which is visible and functional.

'Increasing social opportunities 'was highlighted as one of the issues for improving retention: all opportunities have been taken up to fill nights where the normal practice venue was unavailable to run socially binding events whilst still working within the craft. These have included performance make up and showbiz nights, celebrations of '1 year in' for a large group of members who joined at the same time, running singing workshops, where all were involved closely with its management.

THC is a small but sociable team where all enjoy each other's company. This reflects through to any new people who come along as



they are

welcomed with grace and friendship. Group work within the management team has also proven helpful; grouped sessions when receiving instruction on a topic such as website use and grouped viewing of archived webinars from SAI have been recent successes.

THC's proudest moment of late is the birth of their Web Site, www. taranakiharmony.co.nz. A few years of research and planning have gone into the implementation of this wonderful site. It provides a foundation within the modern frame, appealing to members of all generations, showing THC in action and it has done much to encourage and inspire chorus members.

Coupled with access to lists which can be regularly updated there is now a birthday reminder service which recognises our members on their special day with a rousing, 4 part harmony version of "Happy Birthday" each month; although you know it's coming it's very special and great to be on the receiving end.

THC has continued to grow from strength to strength with

performances, social events and team building. Their active Quartet "In Accord" is now officially out there and performing, making them very proud. THC are eagerly looking forward to competing at the next Convention in Auckland and can now boast that they have four of their newbies enjoying quarteting, who hope to audition as a new quartet in the next few months.

Each of the projects represented in this article have taken time from various THC members who have been thrilled to see the effect of their efforts. We acknowledge their commitment and congratulate them on the result. Although none of these

projects are particularly new if there are choruses who are trying to go through similar changes and would appreciate help we would be happy to provide you with information on how we developed the various tools which we now have available.

Barbershop is my tonic

You drag your sorry self onto the risers. Your aches and pains twinge at the thought of another 3 hours on your feet. The pitch blows.

Bam! You snap on your Barbershop smile, position your body instrument for the first chord, your brain jerks to attention and, suddenly three hours has gone. At the end of the night, you're alive, buzzing, and energized. You've had your dose of Barbershop tonic. So how does that work?

Let's start at the Barbershop 'smile', our 'lifted countenance'. Researchers at the University of Kansas say that even the most fake smile held for no more than 60 seconds is enough to trick our bodies into releasing endorphins, natural pain killers and serotonin, a feel-good hormone.

This in turn starts a cascade of other beneficial chemicals, lowering cortisol (the fight or flight hormone), turning on our immune systems, lowering our heart rate and lowering our blood pressure as much as 18%.

Smiling encourages breathing from the diaphragm. Taking deep breaths stimulates the lymphatic system, which in turn promotes a healthy immune system. Working the lungs oxygenates your blood. Breathing for singing helps clear your sinuses and respiratory tubes.

Singing is proven to raise bodily levels of oxytocin, a neural transmitter associated with pleasure, love and bonding, Immunoglobin A, a protein in the immune system with stimulates antibodies and hydrocortisone, an anti-stress hormone.

Singing, especially Barbershop, is great for posture. Our abdominal and intercostal muscles get a weekly three hour workout. Doing choreo tones our leg and arm muscles. Good posture enhances the flow of energy, blood, hormones, and oxygen to every cell, organ, limb and neuron in our body.

Music generally is a multisensory experience and activates links to several parts of the brain. Female

singers use both left and right brain hemispheres when singing. Men tend to be more right-brain dominant in processing music. We are simultaneously listening, performing, emoting, matching pitches, perceiving language, matching rhythm and fine tuning our body "instrument". Talk about multitasking!

Socially, singing in groups gives us confidence, alleviates loneliness and counters depression. Harvard studies have shown that people who gather together in any social activity outlive their peers by 2 and a half years. Another study showed that joining any group cuts your risk of dying over the next year in half.

All-in-all Barbershop should be a national health imperative. As if we needed a reason to sing! I'll take my medicine in weekly doses, thank you very much.

The weekend was held at Rangi Ruru School, who provided a great venue and fabulous food, especially for those staying over the weekend.

Saturday night presented a heap of fun! Lori and Jana lead a series of team building games, including learning names, throwing beach balls around, and building towers out of dry spaghetti and marshmallows! (We kid you not!). Another fun game was when we were given a word, for example, "star", and we had to come up with as many song titles as possible that included the word. Now, while we participated fully, coming with the titles from our very heads, we are pretty sure that other teams had online assistance (definitely not us hehe).

Christchurch City Chorus were also privileged to be the demonstration chorus on Saturday afternoon. Following on from the prior weekend of rehearsal with Lori, it was fantastic to have further opportunities to be

coached by her and solidify what we had learned.

Each of the workshops over the weekend provided amazing, unmissable areas for learning. While we would love to share everything, space is limited (although we could easily devote a whole Addaline to what we learned!).

Unforgettable points for us include:

- "The magic lies not in the communication of sound, but rather in the sound of communication"
- "Get your nose out of your business!" - you can't create true consonants if half of your sound is going through your nose.
- Use bubbling to practise moving air - bubbling increase the air flow, opens and relaxes the throat, and brings tone to the front of the mouth.
- Vocal chords are fixed at the front and open at the back. If you sing with fast air moving, it helps to bring the vocal chords together.

When singing, the vocal chords come together very quickly - when singing a high A the vocal chords come together 880 times per second.

- The sound of the chorus needs to change from director driven to member driven.
- The only way to make lasting improvements in the chorus is to change you - remember that Garfield said "you are responsible for you"
- "I am only one but still I am one.
 I cannot do everything but still
 I can do something. I will not refuse to do something I can do"

- Pay your dues



On Reaching Bass Camp....

Like Sir Ed, I too like a challenge. I saw the ad in our local paper (along with a nice photo of a lot of greenclad Sweet Adelines grinning their heads off, and holding cups and awards) asking if there's anyone out there who would like to join them? Many of you will know Master Director Barbara Smith retired in December 2012 after 20 years with the Waikato Rivertones Chorus (WRC). What you may not know is that her life of musical excellence was recognised in the Queen's Birthday Honours in June when Barbara was awarded the QSM for Services to Music.

Barbara joined the WRC in 1993 singing Baritone and was President for three years before becoming Musical Director in 1996, an interim measure until someone permanent was found! Under her direction the WRC won the national championships in 2001, 2008 and 2011 earning the right to compete in Nashville (2002) (2009), and Denver (2012). In 2006 Barbara gained the status of Master Director and the WRC competed in the Harmony Classic competition in San Antonio. The WRC won becoming the first non-American chorus to become World Midsized Chorus Champions, with a New Zealand inspired package still talked about in Sweet Adeline circles.

Barbara served as Director of Musical Services on the RMT, and was heavily involved in co-ordinating the Young Women in Harmony programme throughout New Zealand, which culminated in the foundation of the National YWIH chorus in 2003. She and husband Colin have worked tirelessly over the years organising Regional and National Young Men and Women in Harmony events, retiring after the National Finals this year.

Barbara's Barbershop skills are recognised throughout New Zealand and Australia where she is invited to coach numerous Choruses and Quartets. In the wider Sweet Adeline world Barbara has been an International Faculty Member, one of only three New Zealanders to gain this recognition, and has tutored and led groups at Sweet Adeline International conventions in the USA. Barbara was the first New Zealander to be invited to conduct the International YWIH Chorus in Indianapolis in 2004 and the International Family Chorus, with daughter Julie, in Honolulu in 2008. However, Barbara's musical talents extend far wider than Sweet Adelines.

Over the last 45 years she has worked voluntarily for a wide range of other organisations. Barbara is an accomplished pianist whose talents have been used since 1966

to accompany brass players in Regional and National competitions. The New Zealand

A COMPETITION EXPERIENCE IN HONOLULU LIKE NONE OTHER!

Most Sweet Adelines will tell you that singing in an International Competition is

the highlight of their Sweet Adelines life. I certainly agree, but I can times that by two! Due to a unique set of fortuitous circumstances, I had the opportunity to compete in this year's (2013) Honolulu Sweet Adelines' International Competition with TWO choruses! Velvet Hills Show Chorus (VH), Region 8, Colorado Springs, CO AND Christchurch City Chorus (CCC), Region 35, Christchurch, NZ.

Velvet Hills in Colorado Springs, CO is my home chorus. I had been actively preparing for this competition since we won the regional back in 2012. My husband, however, decided that it would be fun to live in another country for a year while he practiced medicine (he was retiring from private practice in Colorado Springs, in the spring of 2013). After narrowing down countries, we chose New Zealand (mostly because they speak English – well, sort of 2 and they seemed to have availability for Locum Tenens, a temporary position for out-of-towners.) He very considerately said he would only apply to cities that had a Sweet Adelines Chorus, knowing it would provide me with a family away from home, so to speak, while he was at work. The Canterbury District Health Board in Christchurch, NZ, responded to his application, and after several

months of legal paperwork, we received our visas. Once it was definite I was moving, I advised my director, Kathy Carmody, who very graciously allowed me to still compete with VH. I then contacted Virginia Humphrey-Taylor, the master director of CCC, who arranged for me to receive recordings and music for their chorus' competition package.

I arrived in Christchurch in August of this year. I kept in close touch with VH through our members' only website, and did attend a weekend retreat in October. In the meantime, I was doggedly determined to learn all of CCC's repertoire for contest, and I qualified on all songs well before we left for Hawaii.

My 10 days in Hawaii were a whirlwind of activity. CCC arrived first, so I had no conflicts initially with rehearsal times (note: Christchurch has several long-distance dual members, affectionately referred to as OOTMs –"out of town members" who come from all over New Zealand (both islands), as well as Australia, the UK, even Sweden!) Once VH arrived on scene, I was able to successfully rehearse with both choruses, with only a little overlap of the two.

Contest day was amazing. With VH being contestant #5, scheduled to sing at 11:39am and CCC not going on stage until 4:50pm, as contestant #23, I had ample time to come off stage at noon, catch a shuttle back to the Hilton, take off all that VH makeup, eat a light lunch, reapply all that CCC makeup and get myself over to CCC's rehearsal room well before my 2pm hair and makeup check. Then final rehearsal with CCC and back on stage! Although I clearly had enough time

between the two performances to not feel rushed, what I did not anticipate was how emotionally taxing the day would be. Turning on all my energy and focus for one performance, only to turn it completely off and then back on again with another chorus really was a challenge. Yet, I felt absolutely obliged to give both choruses 100% of my energy and commitment – a challenge I felt I could meet and conquer.

In the end, the results are ones I am very proud of. Both choruses were able to sing on Saturday. My "home" chorus, Velvet Hills placed 11th and were mic testers for the finals. I (sadly) did not sing with them. My "adopted home" chorus, Christchurch City Chorus, qualified and I eventually secured a 6th place medal with them!

I feel incredibly proud and privileged to have been able to compete in these two fine choruses during this competition. The support I received from both my directors as well as all the members of both choruses was overwhelming and extremely gratifying. I know I could not have done this without them all behind me. This experience has only reinforced what I already knew about Sweet Adelines International; we are a warm, nurturing organization of women supporting women through song and harmony. And my experience at the 2013 International certainly proved that!






YOU CAN HAVE YOUR VERY OWN MEDAL BAR TO KEEP THOSE MEDALS SAFE!

YWIH UPDATE

The last month has been an exciting one with the National YWIH finals held in Hamilton on the 23rd and 24th of September at the Founders Theatre.

There were 9 YWIH Choruses and 13 YWIH quartets who took the stage, representing their region and their schools. The standard this year was outstanding and it seems to be getting better every year!

The chorus contest this year was a close one, with only 1 point between 1st and 2nd place! Last year, ACBC from Aotea College (directed by David Brooks) were the winners, however this year, Maiden Tawa from Tawa College (directed by Charlotte Murray) beat them by one point and were named YWIH Chorus Champions for 2013. Both choruses were fantastic and bought different exciting elements to the stage.

Third place was Macappella from MacLean's College in Auckland, who did a great job, especially at the evening concert, directed by one of their students Persis Darukhanawalla, as their Director Melody Lowe, had to return to Auckland for GAC rehearsal. It is always great to see young girls stepping up, and step up she did!

The quartet contest this year displayed some amazing young voices from girls all over the country. In 1st place was The Rookies quartet from Aotea College. 2nd place was last year's champions, Dolce from MacLean's College, and the 3rd place quartet was also from Aotea College, Marvel Us who are an exciting young quartet to watch out for in the future.

The judging panel was an experienced one with Lynne Smith (Showmanship) Virginia Humphrey-Taylor (Sound), Claire Takacs (Expression) and Kate Sinclair (Music) in charge of determining the winners.

This year we also said goodbye to 2 of YWIH's long standing regional coordinators, who were also the coordinators of the Nationals this vear. Barbara and Colin Smith have stepped down from their roles in the Waikato region, and we thank them for all the commitment and contributions they have made to young women in NZ. The nationals this year ran smoothly and this is all testament to their organisation and hard-work. We wish you both well in your future endeavours.

NEWS FROM HE TANGATA

He Tangata goes to Hawaii!



The 'He Tangata Show Chorus' is heading to Hawaii to perform in the 'Hawaii International Show' hosted by the world champion Rönninge Show Chorus along with a selection of guest choruses and quartets, including our own Christchurch City Chorus and Greater Auckland Chorus. The show is to be held at the Hilton Hotel, Ballroom 3 on the 4th of November and heralds the start of the Sweet Adelines 2013 International Convention programme.

The journey for 'He Tangata' toward this exciting pinnacle has been the culmination of many weekend workshops where we primarily get to enhance our skills under the direction of NZ Master Director, Virginia Humphrey-Taylor but also to enjoy some social fun and friendship along the way. The atmosphere at these workshops is very relaxed, albeit Virginia expects a high level of performance. 'He Tangata' [translation]... 'the people' - is all about friendship and the pure enjoyment of singing. In Hawaii the package for 'He Tangata', which is to be performed at the Show includes

songs particularly relevant to New Zealand. A song made famous by Kiri Te Kanawa, "A Te Tarakihi", moving, dramatic and bound to put a chill up the spine, also "NZ Treasure" a gorgeous ballad about our beautiful country and 'it's people' that fills us all with emotion and national pride. "Poi E" is also likely to be performed. 'He Tangata' will be joined by the Chch City Chorus in performing the above songs, which adds strength not only by way of stage presence but will create a solid and effective wall of sound that is sure to provide a memorable treat for our international audience! Our 'Kiwi presence' will be further enhanced by He Tangata performing a song of welcome as people arrive for the Show with their version of the beautiful Hawaiian song "Aloha Oe". He Tangata will stand out with their beautiful silk paua scarves draped over the shoulders that will be worn over black for maximum effect. As well as the Show package He Tangata will go to Hawaii prepared to perform a selection of upbeat songs like "Sound Celebration", "Here and Now" and "Got A Lot of Living". The beautiful "Hine/ Pokarekare Ana Medley" is

shaping up well and this may also be performed if it gets the big tick from Virginia.



There are currently about 45 members of the 'He Tangata Show Chorus' from as far north as Whangarei to Christchurch and we would like to encourage you to join us. We encourage potential members to take in a weekend with 'He Tangata', come and see what we do, everyone will know someone who is already in the chorus, have a chat to them, tag along - we know you'll be hooked! It has been the vision of the 'He Tangata Show Chorus' to provide an option for members who want to expand their horizons and add 'that little something else' to our Sweet Adelines experience. The chorus, as a 'New Zealand Show Chorus' presents the opportunity to travel, e.g. Hawaii, but also to Australia and further afield. A trip to Australia in 2014 is on the drawing board to sing with some of the Australian choruses.

'He Tangata' has enjoyed weekend workshops in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch but more often than not they are held in Wellington, given it is a central location. The annual membership fee for 'He Tangata' is \$130.00, (for members under 25 it is half that amount). There is a \$50 joining fee, and if you should decide you wish to fully take part, a further payment of \$80 is required which totals the first year's membership. 
